What is a Refugee?

The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) defines a refugee as "someone who is unable or unwilling to return to their country of origin owing to a wellfounded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion."



Background/ Historical Context of war

- ≻ Russia invaded Ukraine on February 24th (OECD 2022).
- ≻ Regional Refugee Response Plan (RRP)
- ▶ 7,843,714 Ukrainian refugees in Europe (Operational Data Portal 2022).
- 6,540,000 Ukrainians are internally displaced people (International Organization of Migration 2022).
- ➤ 42% of Ukrainian refugees are children while 83% of the adults were women in Lithuania (OECD 2022).
- ≻ "War on women (Cindoglu 2022)"

Economic Assimilation


"People are here with their kids, but without husbands, without parents, and often without money or work" -Olena Nikolaenko, Ukrainian Refugee



Lack of opportunities

- Women made up 47% of the workforce in Ukraine
- Ukrainian refugees have higher levels of education.
- "Domestic, office or hotel cleaners and helpers"
- > Poor Working Conditions
- ≻ Child Care
- ➤ Consequences

The Separation of Families


- ➤ Martial Law instituted on 24 February 2022
- 78% of refugees to bordering countries had to separate from at least one immediate family member (UNODC)

Risk of Exploitation and Trafficking

- Traffickers exploit situations of mass chaos
- EU's Common Anti-Trafficking Plan have found the threat of trafficking to be high (UNODC)
- Sexual exploitation, forced labor, illegal adoption and surrogacy, and forced criminality
- > 2001 EU Temporary Protection Directive; "Dublin Regulation"





Access to Healthcare

- Language barriers, unfamiliarity with the receiving country's health system, and lack of knowledge regarding their rights and entitlements to accessing services
- Chronic diseases: Type 1 Diabetes & Asthma
- Low COVID-19 immunization rate

Susceptibility to Trafficking & Abuse After Emigrating



"Risks [of conflict-based sexual violence] are exacerbated by the dissolution of protective social and civil structures during humanitarian crises. [...] Lack of family support intersects with vulnerabilities such as age, refugee status and gender and increases the risks they face throughout their migration trajectory." (Neal, et al.)
